Chair's Report

I am pleased to present the St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. Annual Report for the financial year ended 30 June 2023.

This past year has seen significant changes in the leadership of our organisation and I acknowledge and thank the Board, all staff and volunteers for working through the transition of the change in leadership with our Chief Executive Officer. Thank you to former Chief Executive Judith Barker who resigned from St John NT in September 2022.

We were pleased to welcome Andrew Tombs into the role of Chief Executive in January 2023 and thank Peter Ali for providing transitional support in the role.

As leadership transitioned the Board also took the opportunity to reflect on overall governance, particularly in reference to attracting and securing a broader mix of diversity and skill to the Board, and ensuring the right focus was being applied across the business through a suite of revised Board Committees which will replace our existing committees during the 2023-24 financial year.

The new committees include:

Highlights

Recycling old uniforms to help fight textile waste

International Paramedics Day marks the day to celebrate paramedics and first responders around the globe for the vital role they play in our communities. For St John NT it also marked the launch of a new uniform for paramedic staff on 8 July 2022.

Over \$300k was invested into the new uniforms with expected benefits of improved staff satisfaction and morale due to increased comfort, wearability and a wider range of options that are available. The uniform, designed for the unique Territory conditions, was the culmination of 18 months' work from a dedicated uniform committee of frontline workers.

The process of designing the new uniforms began in 2020 with St John NT establishing a staff led uniform review committee and engaging Workwear Group as a new supplier working closely together on the development to ensure that the design was fit for operational purposes. Workwear have also been able to provide an online system to make ordering uniforms easier for staff.

St John NT made the commitment to being environmentally friendly with the uniform changeover and researched several options for recycling or disposal of the old uniforms. It was determined that the best option was to engage with textile recycling company UPPAREL.

Collection containers were made available on station across all locations for crews to return old uniforms.

The partnership with UPPAREL resulted in the achievement of 1,451kg of textile material being diverted from landfill and 5,078.5kg in greenhouse gasses being prevented, minimising the environmental impact of disposal.

St John NT is proud to participate in the overarching mission to eradicate textile waste from landfills and play our part in achieving the greatest possible positive impact on the environment.





St John NT invests big in building community resilience

St John NT officially opened its new retail store at 412 Stuart Highway, Winnellie in August 2022.

The \$400,000 refurbishment of the property represents a significant investment into its commercial first aid training, sales and equipment business as well as clinical training facilities for the ambulance service.

After 10 years at 416 Stuart Highway, the new store provides improved sales and warehousing facilities, easy access and additional parking, and while the move was only two doors from the old premises, former CEO Judith Barker said that St John NT had taken major steps in improving its service to the community.

"The new premises represents a commitment to providing members of our community with the skills and equipment to be able to save lives in an emergency," she said.

Further additions and refurbishment to the building allowed for a new dedicated

training facility designed around the needs of the ambulance team, with the first group of new recruits enjoying the new facilities at the end of June 2023. The space enables staff to do hands-on training in medical procedures, patient assessment, administering medications, and handling medical equipment.

Induction and training for corporate staff, paramedic interns, qualified paramedics and patient transport officers is designed to ensure that all new and existing staff are thoroughly prepared for the responsibilities and demands of their roles.

Community resilience - the first step in emergency response for all Territorians

St John NT launched a Community Resilience Package to assist community groups and sporting clubs who organise low risk events and community activities to be prepared in the instance of a medical emergency in April 2023.

As an organisation, St John NT is committed to caring for all Territorians and advocates for

all members of our community to understand what to do in an emergency.

The Community Resilience
Package, valued at approximately
\$500, caters to events that fall into
the lowest risk category, however
St John NT encourages all Territory
organisations to ensure their
members have the first aid skills
and knowledge to act as a first
responder in an emergency.

The package aims to provide vital first aid knowledge and skills to event organisers, by providing free first aid training and equipment to low-risk events and includes:

- a risk assessment of the event and presentation to organising committee on how to be prepared for a medical emergency.
- two "Provide First Aid" fully accredited training courses
- 10% off any additional courses
- a first aid kit

Knowing that the immediate actions of a first responder can have a significant impact on the health outcome for the patient, is the first step we all have in taking responsibility for the wellbeing of those attending community events.



New e-learning tool for learner drivers to help save lives

St John NT supported the nationwide launch of a new Learner Driver First Aid program in November 2022. The online learning tool offers new drivers a free 30 minute basic first aid course as part of the process for obtaining their license and is based on the "First@Scene" online program originally developed in the NT more than 10 years ago.

Designed with young people in mind the Learner Driver First Aid tool aims to provide learner drivers with skills that could save or prolong a life until paramedic care arrives. St John NT Director Ambulance Services Andrew Thomas said the program aims to encourage basic first aid skills as a pre-requisite for obtaining a driver's license across Australia.

"Over one third of these crashes involved people under the age of 25, this is over three times higher than last year. On top of this there has been a significant number of car crashes involving serious injury."

"These statistics are frightening," Mr Thomas said.

"We know that receiving bystander first-aid in the time it takes emergency services to arrive at the scene reduces pre-hospital deaths and severe injury. If this learning system helps save another life it is well worth the investment of time in doing the courses," he said.

The program is available free of charge to all learner drivers and has been promoted in the NT Government Drive Safe campaign.

The course takes approximately 30 – 45 minutes and covers an introduction to first aid, basic life support following the DRSABCD action plan and how to deal with wounds and bleeding.

Participants will be issued with a certificate once they have completed the course.

"Completing the course aims to improve basic first aid knowledge and provide learner drivers with the confidence to assist until professional medical help arrives.

"The last thing our paramedics want is to arrive on the scene of an accident where another family has lost a loved one," Mr Thomas said.





Lifesaving procedure reduces crash victim trauma

When eight-year-old Harrison Grey was hit by a car in December 2022, it was a stroke of luck that two of the paramedics who responded to the call were trained in a procedure that ultimately meant the difference between life and death.

St John NT paramedics Toby Bugter and Dan Robertson were two of four intensive care paramedics who, at the time, were trained in rapid sequence intubation (RSI) in the Territory.

Being trained in the life saving procedure means they were able

to reduce the impact of Harrison's head injury by placing him in an induced coma under general anaesthetic on the way to hospital.

Mr Roberston said it was "purely luck of the draw" that both paramedics were trained in the procedure.

"Essentially it's where we put this critically ill injured patient under general anaesthetic and we do that to try and prevent any further injury to the brain and in Harrison's case try to give him the very best outcome we possibly can," he said.

"And it just so happens that day that Toby and I were both working and we were able to offer that new skill to Harrison." The eight-year-old and his mother Paula Apostoles met with the paramedics who worked on him for more than an hour on the side of the road, following months in an Adelaide hospital.

"I'm very happy that I got to come and see the people that saved his life," Ms Apostoles said.

Harrison's case was the first example of a child receiving the treatment but RSI has since been used on many similar incidents across the Top End.

St John NT continues to provide training and upskilling of intensive care paramedics to extend accessibility to these skills and procedures.



Our Community

With more than 70 years' experience in the Northern Territory, St John NT understands the challenges of delivering services across vast distances in tropical and arid environments. We understand the needs and conditions of our communities and remain committed to helping people build resilience, to be prepared and know how to respond in an emergency.



Tour guide acknowledged with Save a Life Award

When central Australian 100% Adventure tour guide, James De Angelis, sprang into action to care for a member of his tour who was suffering from a cardiac arrest while trekking in Ormiston Gorge, he did so without hesitation. A critical response which meant the difference between life and death.

James was acknowledged for his actions with a Save a Life Award presented to him by former CEO Judith Barker and Director Ambulance Services, Andrew Thomas in Alice Springs in July 2022.

For those who attended the scene, the incident was described as a textbook response.

"The 72-year-old patient survived a life-threatening situation due to the quick actions of James who was carrying an AED, a doctor who was also on the tour, and a well-coordinated emergency medical retrieval process from a team of services," Director Ambulance Services Andrew Thomas said.

"The role of the first responder can often mean the difference between life or death with only 1 in 10 typically surviving a sudden cardiac arrest. James' quick thinking and levelheaded response resulted in the patient being resuscitated successfully."

"Park Rangers had access to the site and were able to assist the patient across a deepwater crossing while NTES were activated and went in with a stretcher to convey the patient out. The patient was then transferred via ambulance to Alice Springs Hospital for further treatment," Mr Thomas added.

The patient subsequently made a full recovery and returned to his family in Western Australia. He expressed his gratitude to all involved.

St John Save a Life Awards may be awarded to a person who contributes, through the application of first aid, to saving the life of another person. St John NT extends their heartfelt thanks and congratulations to James on receiving the Award and saving the life of the tour participant.

RepTrak

St John is once again ranked as one of the most trusted, admired and respected charities in Australia.

The 2022 results revealed that St John nationally ranked at number 5 out of the top 40 Australian charities in the Annual Charity/ Not for Profit reputation study by RepTrak, up from 6 in 2022. Overall St John's reputation in Australia is excellent (92.6). This year it has increased awareness "first aid training" (+4%), "medical services at events" (+3%), and "community social services" (+4%). St John NT has the highest

level of awareness out of all of the states and territories of St John.

St John NT's reputation score is excellent, sitting slightly above the national average. Interaction with St John NT is also very high with more than 80% of the public familiar with our services. Almost 4 in 5 have interacted with at least one touchpoint – this is significantly more than the national benchmark.

Awareness of programs - first aid, ambulance, first aid kit and defibrillator sales, medical services at events - is stable year on year and remains well above 50%.

Patient Experience Survey

The annual Patient Experience Survey conducted and released by the Council of Ambulance Authorities (CAA) shows that patient satisfaction rates among Territorians sits at 99% with most patients surveyed finding their experience dealing with St John NT to be positive overall – the highest proportion out of any other Australian ambulance service.

NT respondents to the 2023 survey indicated:


regarded the provision of care they received as "very good", 8% regarded the provision of care as "good"

Street Smart High

St John NT was proud to once again support the annual Street Smart High event conducted by AANT in May. The event hosted more than 1,300 senior school students at the Darwin Convention Centre, with the aim of developing positive road safety knowledge, skills and attitudes amongst the next generation of drivers and riders.

Road crashes are one of the leading causes of death for young people under the age of 25, the day a young driver gains their provisional license their crash rate increases 20 to 30 times.

St John NT provided paramedics and an ambulance for the very life like road crash scenario, brining to life the true impact of road trauma. First aid trainers and community education staff were also on hand to provide information and demonstrations on how to do CPR and respond at the scene of a crash.



Restart a Heart Day – 16 October

On world Restart a Heart Day, Sunday 16 October, St John NT joined forces with other Ambulance Services across Australia and New Zealand to raise awareness about out-of-hospital cardiac arrest, the importance of CPR and having access to an AED within local communities.

The role of the first responder can often mean the difference between life or death with only 1 in 10 typically surviving a sudden cardiac arrest. Often the first responder is not a health care professional but a family member or civilian who is nearby when the event takes place.

St John NT first aid trainers, volunteers and paramedics were at out across the Territory in Alice Springs, Darwin and Palmerston on October 14 providing CPR demonstrations and encouraging community members to participate and sign up for CPR courses.

St John NT also ran free and discounted CPR courses in October in Darwin, Palmerston. Katherine and Alice Springs.





Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan

St John NT officially launched its Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) document during NAIDOC week in July 2022.

The document represents a formal commitment to advance reconciliation through St John NT's business objectives.

In a combined statement St John NT Chair, Peter Carew AM and former CEO, Judith Barker said "It is an honour to present our Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan as the first steps in St John NT's reconciliation journey. We trust that this plan, along with a new strategic direction and our guiding principles for our ambulance service entitled "Caring for All Territorians" will help contribute towards bridging the gap in health care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples."

"We would like to specifically thank Darwin artist, Sarrita King, for creating our RAP artwork which illustrates how St John NT contributes to the health and healing of our community through the work that we do."

While more work is yet to be achieved in the RAP, progress has been made in the following areas:

- Establish and strengthen mutually beneficial relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander stakeholders and organisations.
- Build relationships through celebrating National Reconciliation Week (NRW).
- Promote reconciliation through our sphere of influence.
- Promote positive race relations through antidiscrimination strategies.
- Demonstrate respect to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples by observing cultural protocols.


- Build respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and histories by celebrating NAIDOC Week.
- Build accountability and transparency through reporting RAP achievements, challenges and learnings both internally and externally.



St John NT comprises of a workforce of close to 800 staff and volunteers committed to serving the community.



Paramedics recognised in The King's Birthday Honours List

Intensive Care Paramedics, Mark Ferguson and Warren Purse, were acknowledged in The King's Birthday Honour List 2023 with Ambulance Service Medals (ASM).

"Both Mark and Warren (Wazza) have led exemplary careers with St John NT, providing valuable leadership in both our ambulance service and as volunteers to the Order of St John," CEO Andrew Tombs said

Mark Ferguson has been a frontline paramedic with St John NT for over 21 years, having joined the service as a professional paramedic after a career in the retail industry and as a volunteer for St John NT in Katherine NT.

He attained the level of Intensive Care Paramedic 15 years ago and has expanded his skill set by being involved in a national project known as Extended Care Paramedic (ECP), which enables paramedics to provide care within the community to reduce presentations to hospital Emergency Departments around Australia.

In addition to this, Mark has a devoted a large portion of his life to the Order of St John, he has supported the volunteer division as a member, the Director and the Commissioner. His compassion and dedication for the cause continues today as an influencing factor in the development of cadets (youth) into our organisation and will do for generations to come.

Warren Purse has been with St John NT for over 19 years, having joined the service as a paramedic following a career as a medic in the Army in 2003 and gained his Intensive Care Paramedic qualification in 2005. In 2012 he was one of the first Duty Managers appointed to provide on shift leadership and support to crews. From 2013-2015 Warren also increased his clinical skills as part of the national Extended Care Paramedic (ECP) Project. In 2018, he commenced as an Intensive Care Paramedic on the Critical Response Unit. Warren was one of the first ICP's to be recruited into this new role.

Warren has been a strong advocate for Road Safety over the past 15 years in the Northern Territory, assisting with the education of school students, community and public messaging, sharing his own experiences as a paramedic and someone who has lost a loved one.

During Covid-19, both Warren and Mark provided valuable leadership in the development of the St John NT "Ambulance Assist" program whereby volunteers were trained to support ambulance crews in the case of a surge in demand.

Lifesaving acts of bravery

Two Top End locals were also recognised for their bravery, quick-thinking and ability to remain calm under pressure at the St John NT 2022 Excellence Awards.

Jessica Silvester was acknowledged for saving the life of her father. During a family lunch Jessica's dad was in the kitchen when the knife he was using slipped from his hand and landed embedded in his leg. Jessica sprang into action applying

pressure to the wound and using an exercise band to fashion a makeshift torniquet.

Delivery driver Eric Nothnagl saved the life of a woman while delivering a parcel to her residence. Eric noticed that the woman wasn't breathing normally and when she became unconscious he calmly helped her to the ground and immediately called Triple Zero (000). Having never provided CPR or first aid before Eric was guided by the call operator and continued to perform compressions until paramedics arrived.

Intensive care paramedic Mark Ferguson, who was on the scene for both incidents, commended both Jessica and Eric on their bravery, "Jessica's actions were exemplary, if it wasn't for her quick thinking the outcome could have been a very different story," Mr Ferguson said.

"Mr Nothnagi's ability to stay calm and follow the directions of the call operator saved the patient's life, without his confidence to have a go the patient would not be here today."
